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## Bureau of Program and Community Development - Compendium Introduction

The Bureau of Program and Community Development is responsible for the development, implementation and oversight of a wide range of community based program initiatives. The Bureau supports over \$90 million in state and federally funded initiatives (including TANF - Temporary Assistance to Needy Families funds) along with approximately 350 programs.

Below is an overview of Bureau contract-related initiatives including the program's value/source, number of programs, and average number of participants served per year. In addition to the programs listed below, the Bureau offers a number of other related projects described in the compendium.

The initiatives range from primary prevention and family support programs to projects that prevent out-of-home placement and maintain children in their local community. The age range of program participants vary from prenatal infants to caregivers who are great-grandparents. All Bureau programs seek to address performance outcomes as a way to determine project success and contribute to permanency. In addition, training and technical assistance is provided by OCFS on a regular basis to promote quality programs.

## Child Protective Services (CPS) / Domestic Violence (DV) Collaborations

- **Need for service** - Studies show that domestic violence (DV) exists in 40% to 60% of the child protective caseload. When DV is not identified or appropriately addressed, case outcomes can be compromised. As a result, Child Protective Services (CPS) / Domestic Violence programs were developed to address these overlapping issues.
- **Target population** - Families involved in the child protective system who also have domestic violence present in their households.
- **Locations** - Sites are distributed throughout the state with the exception of NYC. Counties with an OCFS funded CPS/DV collaboration include; Albany, Broome, Chautauqua, Madison, Monroe, Montgomery, Niagara, Nassau, Onondaga, Rensselaer, Rockland, Suffolk, and Westchester. Each program typically provides services countywide.
- **Eligibility for services** - Families involved in the child protective system that also have domestic violence present in their households. Various tools such as investigative techniques, examination of prior history, and self reporting are utilized to determine if services are applicable.
- **Number of programs** - 13
- **Funding** -
  - Federal Family Violence Preventive Services Act Funds (FFVPSA) - 5 projects funded for 12-month contract terms for a total of \$274,000.
  - State Community Based Prevention Funds (CBP) - 8 projects funded for 18-month contract terms for a total of \$517,696.
- **Contract term** - 5 FFVPSA Contracts - 3/2/05 - 3/1/10  
3 CBP Contracts - 9/29/05 - 9/28/10  
5 CBP Contracts - 11/30/06 - 9/28/10
- **Program structure** - OCFS contracts with an approved non-profit DV agency to partner with the county Local Department of Social Services. The DV agency outstations a DV advocate at the CPS office to assist Child Protective Services in addressing the multiple needs of these families.
- **Services provided** - In each of the counties, a domestic violence advocate is co-located at the CPS office and typically provides case consultation, participates in home visits, participates in cross-training and works jointly with CPS caseworkers to safety plan with domestic violence victims and their children. The domestic violence advocate also participates in a workgroup of CPS and DV staff to develop and refine protocol and to case conference. In many instances, the advocate is also providing direct services to these families and/or referring families to the DV program or other programs for longer term services.
- **Program outcomes and results** - Desired outcomes of these projects include:
  - improved casework practice and joint case planning
  - reduced reoccurrence and improved safety for adult and child victims
  - improved accountability for abusers and opportunities to change where appropriate

There has been a significant increase in the number of families identified with DV and provided with appropriate and safe interventions.

- **Additional Bureau response** - In 2007, OCFS added a strategy to the Child and Family Service Review (CSFR) to improve outcomes for families experiencing both child abuse and domestic violence. An advisory group for the CPS/DV strategy was formed and is made up of members from DV, CPS and judicial systems, including state and national experts. This group worked on drafting guidelines to assist DV and CPS programs to work collaboratively with families, thereby increasing the resources available to these families.

NYS is only one of three states chosen to receive technical assistance from the Federal Family Violence Prevention fund. With the help of the national fund, OCFS is embarking on efforts to improve engagement of abusive fathers, while holding them accountable, offering opportunities to change, and maintaining victim safety.

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## Domestic Violence Services

- **Need for service** - Domestic violence is a serious, widespread and potentially life threatening problem, crossing all racial, social, geographic, economic, educational and religious barriers. In addition to its physical and emotional impacts on adult victims, domestic violence can affect the health and well-being of children in the household and has major implications for society in general. Domestic violence is costly to the workplace, the health and social services systems, the criminal justice system, and many other social structures.
- **Legislative mandate** - In accordance with Chapter 838 of the NY State Social Service Laws of 1987 and subsequent Aid to Localities budget provisions, local social service districts are required to provide residential and non-residential services to all victims of domestic violence regardless of a person's financial eligibility. Three sets of regulations provide standards for the services and reimbursement of these programs; 18 NYCRR 452-455 provides the staffing and environmental standards for residential programs; 18 NYCRR 462 provides the non-residential program standards; and 18 NYCRR 408 establishes the local social service district responsibilities for eligibility and payment.
- **Target population** - All New York State survivors of domestic violence and their children
- **Locations** - Each county provides services directly or through a purchase of service agreement. A list of providers, by county, is available on the OCFS website.
- **Eligibility for services** - All New York State survivors of domestic violence and their children are eligible for these services. There is no income eligibility for admission to these programs.
- **Number of programs** - Statewide, 102 agencies operate a total of 160 residential programs and 87 non-residential programs for victims of domestic violence.
- **Funding** - OCFS administers approximately \$4 million in Federal Family Violence Prevention and Services Act funds on an annual basis to all agencies that operate an approved residential and/or non-residential program. Funds are equitably distributed on a non-competitive basis based on the number of approved agencies and funds available. Additionally, TANF and/or Title XX per diem reimbursements are available for residential program bednights, depending on the resident's temporary assistance eligibility. Local districts contract with non-residential providers using Title XX overclaim funds, which are eligible for 50% state reimbursement. TANF non-residential funds are also allocated to local districts to support expanded and/or enhanced non-residential domestic violence services for persons under 200% of poverty.
- **Contract term** - FFVPSA programs are funded as part of a 5-year contract shell from 2008 – 2013. Funding is contingent upon available resources.
- **Program structure** - All counties are required to provide non-residential domestic violence services directly or through a purchase of services agreement and all counties contract with an approved residential program for victims of domestic violence. The FFVPSA grant funds are utilized by agencies operating either an OCFS licensed domestic violence residential

program and/or an OCFS approved non-residential DV program. These programs offer required core services to victims of domestic violence and their children.

- **Services provided** - Core service requirements outlined in the program regulations include hotline, information and referral, outreach and education, counseling, and advocacy. Optional services include support groups, language translation, transportation, and children's services. As funding allows, programs also provide various other services to improve the safety and self-sufficiency options available to victims and their children.
- **Program outcomes and results** - OCFS collects data from all approved providers through a web-based DV information system. Statistical information is aggregated and provided in an annual report to the Governor and Legislature. In 2006, approximately 15,000 persons were admitted to residential programs and approximately 42,720 were admitted to non-residential programs. Occupancy rates, length of stay and denial information is also available in the report. For the FFVPSA contracts which begin in 3/31/08, programs will be reporting the percentage of persons who create safety plans and obtain needed referral services.
- **Additional Bureau response** - In addition to the annual report to the Governor and the state legislature, OCFS works closely with the NYS Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence, the NYS Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Division of Criminal Justice Services and Crime Victims Board to coordinate service delivery and promote best practices.

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## Education and Training Voucher Program

- **Need for service** - Provides up to \$5,000 per year for college and vocational training for youth. It is designed to help youth aging out of foster care make the transition to self-sufficiency and receive the education, training and services necessary to obtain employment.
- **Legislative mandate** - The Promoting Safe and Stable Families Amendments of 2001, Public Law 107-133 Title II, section 201, of the amendments, entitled "Education and Training Vouchers for Youth Aging Out of Foster Care," amended section 477 of Title IV-E of the Social Security Act
- **Target population** - Youth in foster care or adoption after the age of 16
- **Locations** - Statewide
- **Eligibility for services** -
  - Youth who are in foster care, were adopted from foster care over the age of 16 or aged out of foster care.
  - Ages 17-21
  - Have a high school diploma or GED
  - Accepted into or enrolled in an accredited college or vocational / technical training program
- **Number of programs** - One program to serve all eligible individuals throughout the State
- **Funding** - \$2,620,762 in Federal funds with a local match consisting of \$298,112 from the local district/counties and \$357,079 from the contractor, Orphans Foundation of America (OFA).
- **Contract term** - 10/1/07- 9/30/12
- **Program structure** - Program is coordinated by OCFS and serves the counties in New York State that wish to participate.
- **Services provided** - Provides funding for student needs such as tuition, books, living expenses, rent, childcare, health insurance, computers, and groceries. In addition, academic support, transportation assistance and scholarships are made available.
- **Program outcomes and results** - In accordance with a 2006-OCFS LCM-10 and subsequent LCMs and federal requirements, the program is designed to:
  - Disburse 100% of funding to eligible students based on an individualized assessment of need
  - Track student progress to assure good standing status
  - Develop and implement a comprehensive statewide outreach strategy
  - Provide in-kind match to students in the form of "care" packages, toolkits, intern programs, donations for computer purchases, scholarship programs and the coaching connection program
  - Communicate with local district ETV coordinators regarding county funding match
  - Provide counties and private agencies access to student records

## Healthy Families New York (Home Visiting Program)

- **Need for service** - Nearly one third of abused children will also abuse their own children. Someone who is abused has an increased chance of unemployment and dependence on public assistance. Two thirds of individuals in drug treatment, report that they were abused as children. In addition, early brain development points to consistent, responsive care and a safe calm environment as important elements in the first months of life. As a result, children who do not play much or rarely touch, develop brains 20-30% smaller than normal. Families are also less likely to seek services in the community than accept those services in their home.

Healthy Families New York (HFNY), sometimes referred to as the NYS Home Visiting Program, was designed to provide home-based services to expectant families and new parents beginning prenatally or shortly after childbirth. Participants are screened to identify risk factors and stressors that the family may face. Families who participate are offered long-term supportive services until the child is in school or Head Start. The program focuses on child safety while at the same time supporting families. The program goals support positive parent-child bonding and relationships, promote optimal child health and development, enhance parental self-sufficiency, and prevent child abuse and neglect.

- **Legislative mandate** - In 2000, Chapter 141 of the Laws of NY was signed and made the NYS Home Visiting Program permanent while enabling expansion of the program.
- **Target population** - The target population is expectant families as well as those families that have a child under the age of 3 months at the time of enrollment. Families referred to the program generally have risk factors such as low income and little emotional support.
- **Locations** - The program is located in 39 urban and rural communities based on high-risk zip code areas throughout the state, including 15 entire counties and 13 programs in NYC.
- **Eligibility for services** - Expectant or newly parenting individuals with a child under 3 months of age are eligible for services. Families are further assessed using the KEMPE Family Stress Checklist to determine eligibility or referral.
- **Number of programs** - 39 programs in high need communities in NYS
- **Funding** - Approximately \$23,463,308 million primarily through State funds in combination with TANF funds. In addition, \$506,643 in TANF Prevention, and \$714,000 in Community Optional Preventive Services Funds (COPS).
- **Contract term** - Healthy Families NY programs are funded as part of a 5-year contract shell. Funding is contingent upon available resources.
- **Program structure** - OCFS, Prevent Child Abuse of NY (PCANY) and the Center for Human Services Research (CHSR) make up the Central Administration team of HFNY. OCFS provides funding and overall oversight for HFNY. PCANY provides staff development and quality assurance. CHSR provides the data management and along with

OCFS, the evaluation of the programs. The Central Administration is responsible for policy development, training, and technical assistance. A formal contractual agreement is made between lead agencies and OCFS to provide HFNY services in the targeted communities. The lead agency is responsible for reporting to OCFS regarding program success in meeting objectives and program targets.

- **Services provided -**

- Home visits weekly until the baby is at least 6 months old, then less often as family stability increases until the child is in a Head Start or kindergarten
- Assesses children for developmental delays and makes referrals if a delay is suspected
- Opportunities such as events, parenting groups, or peer groups that help participants develop a social support network
- Fatherhood initiatives designed to engage fathers to more actively participate in the family
- Referrals to needed medical services as well as education, employment or training services
- Assist families to link with medical providers
- Assists mothers with breastfeeding issues and support
- Advocates for the family

- **Program outcomes and results -** Performance targets for HFNY are identified below. Results are available on the OCFS web site.

In addition, randomized trial findings indicate that:

- HFNY helped parents develop healthier parenting attitudes and a better understanding of child development
- Participation in HFNY resulted in less harmful parenting practices
- HFNY led to significant improvements in 3 important areas of child health; birth outcomes, access to health care, and breast-feeding.
- HFNY parents reported engaging in more appropriate limit setting
- HFNY parents reported committing, on average, one third fewer instances of severe physical abuse in the target child's second year of life
- HFNY was successful in reducing the use of abusive and neglectful parenting practices for young, first-time mothers who entered the program prior to the child's birth.
- HFNY resulted in significant improvements in family access to health insurance and a primary care provider

- **Additional Bureau response** - Training and technical assistance is provided by OCFS to promote quality programs. Programs are monitored by an extensive data management system which provides full scale quarterly reports to OCFS. In addition, OCFS provides a bi-annual HFNY 3-day staff training institute. OCFS is the co-chair of the Home Visiting Council which is the advisory body for HFNY. OCFS is currently collaborating with the NYS Department of Health's Community Health Worker Program. In addition, collaborations are being held with the NYS Office of Alcohol and Substance Abuse Services on a fetal-alcohol spectrum pilot as well as with OTDA on fatherhood programs. HFNY participates on the state leaders group for the National initiative of Healthy Families America.

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## **NYS Kinship Caregiver Program**

- **Need for service** - In New York State, it is estimated that more than 140,000 grandparents are raising their grandchildren and over 400,000 children are living in households headed by a grandparent or other relative. While these “kinship” families exhibit a wide variety of strengths, the children often face a number of challenges in accessing health, education, financial, counseling and legal services.
- **Legislative mandate** - The NYS Kinship Caregiver Program was created in 2006 to form a statewide network of community-based supportive programs that promote household stability and permanency through services for children and their kinship caregivers. As part of this initiative, the New York State Kinship Navigator Program was also developed as a source for information and referral services to address the needs of kinship caregiver families in all parts of the state.
- **Target population** - Children and their relative caregivers
- **Locations** - Kinship Caregiver Program sites are distributed throughout the state and typically serve a county or multiple counties. The Navigator Program is located in Rochester but serves the entire state.
- **Eligibility for services** - Families in “informal” kinship care as well as those that are in kinship foster care are eligible for services. Eligibility is generally determined by using the child’s income to meet 200% TANF guidelines. There are no eligibility guidelines for the state-funded Navigator Program.
- **Number of programs** - 13 community-based programs plus the statewide Navigator Program.
- **Funding** - Approximately \$2 million in State funds
- **Contract term** - Kinship Caregiver community programs are funded as part of a 5-year contract shell. Funding is contingent upon available resources and is scheduled to conclude in November, 2010. The Navigator Program is funded on an annual basis pending availability of funds.
- **Program structure** - Depending on the locale, caregivers are self referred or may be referred through local social services districts (LDSS) or Family Court. An intake identifies child and caregiver needs. Services are typically provided directly by the site. However, LDSS is often used to supplement caregiver income, and legal staff (on-site or through consultants) are available to address permanency issues. Children and their caregivers receive services until no longer desired.
- **List of services provided through programs** - The NYS Kinship Caregiver Program allows for community-based programs to deliver a wide range of services that address the multiple needs of caregivers and the children in their care including:
  - Counseling
  - Respite
  - Child Medicaid info
  - Housing
  - Legal Information
  - Parenting Skills
  - Case Management
  - Referrals
  - Support Groups
  - Education Advocacy
  - Budgeting & Tax info
  - Child Only Payment Info

The Navigator Program provides information and referral services to all New Yorkers through a toll free phone line (877-4KinInfo) as well as a web site ([www.nysnavigator.org](http://www.nysnavigator.org)).

- **Program outcomes and results**

- Youth in kinship families will thrive through improvements in their family relationships, peer relationships, school engagement, household stability, and their legal status
- Children will be placed in a kinship care family initially stabilized through services to obtain TANF and Medicaid benefits as well as resolving crises that remove the child from imminent health or safety risk.

- **Additional Bureau response** - Training and technical assistance is provided by OCFS to promote quality programs. In addition, steps have been taken to collaborate with state agencies, kinship care coalitions, the legal community and other stakeholders such as AARP to help develop coherent policies and coordinated services for kinship caregivers throughout New York.

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## NYS William B. Hoyt Memorial Children and Family Trust Fund

- **Need for service** - Parents are one of the most important influences in positive child and youth development, yet caregivers often lack the support they need. By strengthening parents and their connections to resources, communities can help children thrive. Likewise, by building on protective factors that include parental resiliency, social connections, and knowledge of parenting and child development, prevention programs such as the Trust Fund can help families build on their existing strengths before any abuse occurs.

Education on the existence and dangers of domestic violence is critical to eliminating the behavior. Children in homes where there is domestic violence may face significant risks to their physical, emotional and mental well being. Trust Fund support for children and their families who experience domestic violence can serve to eliminate the violence, foster children's resiliency, and promote healthy interpersonal relationships.

Elder abuse is a largely unrecognized and underreported form of family violence with often severe consequences to the victim. The Trust Fund seeks to support prevention and intervention services that reach adults who are or may be at risk of physical abuse, emotional abuse, and/or financial exploitation primarily by family members.

- **Legislative mandate** - The mission of the Trust Fund is to prevent family violence in all its forms—child abuse, domestic violence, and elder abuse, and to engage families before abuse occurs, or at the very least, at the point when it is first recognized. The Trust Fund Act was established in 1984 under Article 10-A of the Social Services Law Section 481(a-f).
- **Target population** – Families at risk of family violence: child abuse, elder abuse and domestic violence.
- **Locations** - Trust Fund programs are located statewide. Each program typically services a defined geographic area including county or multiple counties in the case of public education programs (primary prevention) or research projects.
- **Eligibility for services** - Families in high need communities who are at risk of family violence including families with children 0-5; and adults over 60 who may be at risk of or experiencing family violence.
- **Number of programs** – 29 as of January 1, 2009.
- **Funding** - The Trust Fund administers approximately \$3 million in State funds and \$1 million in Federal funds annually.
- **Contract term** - Programs are funded for a 12-month period and may be renewed up to four years beyond original contract period, pending availability of funds and according to the Trust Fund spend down formula (Year I=100 %, Year II = 100%, Year III = 75%, and Year IV= 50%.) Programs beyond four years are funded at the 50% level.

- **Program structure** - Non-profit organizations and local districts are eligible to apply for funding. OCFS subsequently contracts with these entities to address the needs of the families in the targeting communities.
  
- **Services provided** -
  - Trust Fund Child Abuse and Family Support Services** include:
    - Family Resource Centers
      - parenting education
      - child-parent activities
      - learning and social opportunities
      - information and linkages to other services
      - programs promoting family health
      - opportunities for parent leadership
    - Home Visiting Programs including Healthy Families NY
    - Home-based services for special populations including teen parents, dads
    - School-based prevention education programs to support children at risk
  
  - Trust Fund Domestic Violence Programs** include:
    - Supervised visitation services for families affected by DV
    - School-based programs to promote child safety and healthy relationships
    - Counseling and support services for children exposed to domestic violence
  
  - Trust Fund Elder Abuse Programs** include:
    - Community education to increase professional skills in identifying risks
    - Case management and counseling services to support elders at risk
    - Public awareness activities
  
  - Trust Fund Statewide and Regional Programs** include:
    - Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) Prevention Education
    - Elder abuse prevalence study
  
- **Program outcomes and results** -
  - Child abuse prevention** outcomes are: improved parenting skills, improved parent/child interaction; improved social support, increased health care access; increased family self-sufficiency; and increased safety for children at risk of abuse and maltreatment.
  
  - Domestic violence prevention** outcomes are: improved behaviors and/or social skills for children exposed to family violence; improved safety for children and adults experiencing domestic violence; improved parent/child interaction and improved parenting skills.
  
  - Elder abuse prevention** outcomes are: increased recognition of elder abuse and knowledge of related community resources, and improved safety for elders exposed to family violence.
  
  - Statewide and Regional Program** outcomes are: to sustain a coordinated program in all regions of the state by reaching 70%-80% of families with newborns before hospital discharge through educational materials about SBS; to reach 50% of the families with newborns with office-based crying cards distributed by pediatric care providers; to reduce the incidence of abusive head injuries by an additional 30% by the addition of educational material provided by community physicians; to reach 75% of fathers or father figures through this hospital based program.

An elder abuse prevalence study to begin in 2008 will provide reliable data concerning the extent and nature of elder abuse in New York, identify regional differences and social/economical characteristics in elder abuse cases, and offer support for future funding strategies to further address the need.

- **Additional Bureau response** - Through various inter- and intra-agency partnerships, the Trust Fund mission is supported and enhanced. For example, the New York Loves Safe Babies Campaign, spearheaded by the Trust Fund, provides child safety information that is disseminated statewide. Activities relevant to developing a strong statewide network that promotes, provides and improves parenting education is spurred through the Trust Fund's membership on the steering committee for the Parenting Education Partnership initiative. The NYS Family Resource Center Network supported by the Trust Fund serves as a pilot for an outcome study to examine how family resource centers affect the families and communities they serve. Through a partnership with the Center for Human Services Research, six sites, both urban and rural, will participate using standardized measures to examine their effects on developing healthy parenting attitudes, fostering positive parenting behaviors, enhancing social support and other protective factors.

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## TANF Prevention and Post Adoption Services

- **Need for service** – Communities throughout the state often lack sufficient resources to develop local prevention programs and permanency planning services. As a result, the NYS OCFS TANF Prevention and Post Adoption Services Program was created to support community-based efforts that implement a wide range of prevention and permanency planning services. Applicants must align proposed services with service needs identified for their community by public data and demographics. They must also demonstrate consumer input regarding services proposed.
- **Legislative mandate** - The State budget appropriated federal TANF funding for the development of prevention and post adoption services. During the 2008-2009 state fiscal year, TANF funds supported 68 programs statewide, serving over 5,000 high need children and their families.
- **Target population** - Children and their families who are at risk of foster care, in foster care but for whom program services will shorten placement and facilitate reunification, and those whose finalized adoption is at risk of disruption or dissolution.
- **Locations** - TANF Prevention and Post Adoption Services are regionally distributed throughout the state and typically serve a county or multiple counties.
- **Eligibility for services** - Targeted recipients are children and their families who meet TANF income eligibility guidelines (income below 200% poverty level).
- **Number of programs** - Statewide, 68 programs are funded.
- **Funding** - Approximately \$20 million from SFY 07/08 supports 68 programs.
- **Contract term** - TANF Prevention and Post Adoption Services are funded as part of a 5 year contract shell with an expiration of 2010. Annual funding is contingent upon the availability of funding in the State's budget.
- **Services provided** - TANF Prevention and Post Adoption Services allows community-based programs to deliver a wide range of services. These services include but are not limited to:
  - Aftercare Services
  - Post Adoption Services
  - Family Support Centers
  - Respite Care
  - Crisis Phone Lines
  - Therapeutic Support Groups
  - Adolescent Alcohol /Substance Abuse Treatment Services
  - Intensive Case Management For Families Affected by Alcohol and Substance Abuse
  - Advocacy
  - Family Resolutions
  - Functional Family Therapy
  - Clinical Services
  - Case Planning
  - Parent Aide and Skill Training

- **Program outcomes and results -**

TANF Prevention services outcomes include:

- Prevention of placement in foster care
- Prevention of the return to foster care placement or other out-of-home setting
- Prevention of child abuse, neglect, and/or parental alcohol and/or substance abuse
- Accelerate family reunification after foster care, other out-of-home placement, and/or substance abuse treatment which increase risk of placement.

TANF Post Adoption services outcomes include:

- Reduction in the number of pre-adoption disruptions.
- Reduction in the number of post finalization dissolutions
- Reduction in the need for foster care placement of children once they are adopted

- **Additional Bureau response -** OCFS views the availability of Prevention and Post Adoption Services funding as an excellent opportunity to promote culturally competent, child centered, and family focused services at the community- based level.
