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The Kinship Guardianship Assistance Program

Introduction

The Kinship Guardianship Assistance Program (KinGAP) is a federally-supported program for children in kinship foster care. The program provides financial assistance to related caregivers who assume legal guardianship of children who were formerly their foster children. Under this program, most children receive medical coverage.

The program's purpose is to find permanent homes with relatives for foster children who do **not** have a discharge goal of returning to their parent or of being adopted. KinGAP assesses the child and the prospective relative guardian's eligibility for assistance payments. They consider legal, clinical and assessment issues before proceeding with a kinship guardianship assistance arrangement.

KinGAP also assists eligible relatives by providing up to \$2,000 per child as part of the Non-Recurring Guardianship Expenses Program for payment of the costs of securing letters of guardianship of the foster child. Furthermore, KinGAP assists 16-year-olds and older youth after they leave foster care by making independent living services and education and training vouchers available to support permanency and to prepare the child to live independently after the kinship guardianship ends.

KinGAP is available for foster children whether or not they are legally freed for adoption. For this reason, the program appeals for related foster parents, as their guardianship does not require termination of parental rights. If children are not legally freed, kinship care keeps existing family connections intact with siblings, grandparents, and other extended family members. Legal guardianship also leaves open the possibility that children might someday return home to their biological parents, should the issues that brought the children into foster care be resolved.

Background

In October 2008, the federal Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act (P.L. 110-351) created an option for states to provide financial assistance to relatives caring for foster children and becoming legal guardians of those children. The law allowed states to use federal funds (under Title IV-E of the Social Security Act) for subsidies to guardians of eligible children.

New York's subsidized guardianship program was implemented on April 1, 2011, as Part F of Chapter 58 of the Laws of 2010 (Chapter 58) titled "Kinship Guardianship Assistance Program" (KinGAP) (see §§458-a--458-f of the Social Service Law). Chapter 58 also amended the Family Court Act (FCA) and the Surrogate's Court Procedure Act, setting forth standards and procedures relating to the application for and issuance of letters of guardianship to prospective relative guardian(s). The New York State statute meets all federal requirements to operate KinGAP and to obtain federal reimbursement for eligible foster children. In addition, Chapter 58 includes New York State-specific provisions and extends eligibility for this program to eligible non-Title IV-E children.

In 2011, the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) analyzed the program's impact and addressed issues and considerations necessary so social services districts and voluntary foster care agencies could implement and offer this program as a new permanency option. In addition, OCFS consulted with social services districts on pre-implementation work and areas OCFS would need to be address in instructions to the field. OCFS also initiated work with other state agencies (Department of Health, Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance and the Office of Court Administration) about necessary policy and procedural changes.

In 2012, implementation continued with a focus on fine-tuning the program and providing technical assistance to social services districts and voluntary agencies as they encountered more KinGAP cases. One particular area where technical assistance was provided was with entering correct systems codes in information technology systems at OCFS. Much of the technical assistance provided was in regard to coding questions/issues and, as a result, OCFS designed a KinGAP Systems Tip Sheet to walk workers through the information that must be entered into the systems for a KinGAP case.

In 2013, OCFS received more case-specific questions as workers began to address more complex KinGAP cases. Some of the questions raised have resulted in OCFS revising KinGAP materials to address the issues encountered. Updated KinGAP information has been provided regularly via the KinGAP webpage (http://ocfs.ny.gov/kinship/background_and_process.asp) and email notifications. OCFS continues to provide a KinGAP general email mailbox (KinGAPHelp@ocfs.ny.gov) for questions.

OCFS continues to monitor KinGAP data reports to assess progress and to address concerns. An amendment to Title IV-E of the Social Security Act enacted by the federal Preventing Sex Trafficking and Strengthening Families Act (P.L. 113-183) was signed into law on September 29, 2014. The federal Act provides that, under certain conditions, a successor guardian will be eligible to receive kinship guardianship assistance payments upon the death or incapacity of the relative guardian. OCFS has formulated an implementation plan for P.L. 113-183, including the provision for KinGAP successor guardianship when the identified KinGAP guardian becomes incapacitated or deceased.

In 2015, OCFS issued Administrative Directive 15-OCFS-ADM-15 *Continuation of the Kinship Guardianship Assistance Program (KinGAP) to a Successor Guardian* to address continuation of KinGAP payments to a successor guardian if the original guardian receiving KinGAP payments dies

or is incapacitated. Part L of Chapter 56 of the Laws of 2015 amended Title 10 of Article 6 of the Social Services Law to enact the provision relating to successor guardians.

The appendix of this report contains a comprehensive list of all KinGAP activities in 2015. Links are provided on the list to written materials developed for this program.

Reporting Requirements

In addition to establishing KinGAP, Section 12 of Part F of Chapter 58 set forth reporting requirements for OCFS with regard to KinGAP and some additional relevant data. No later than February 1, 2012, and each year thereafter, OCFS must report the required information to the Governor, Speaker of the Assembly, Temporary President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the Chair of the Assembly Committee on Children and Families and the Chair of the Senate Committee on Children and Families, detailing the implementation and progress of KinGAP.

The information is to be provided yearly and includes, but is not limited to:

- The total number statewide, and number of children in each local department of social services (LDSS), who have entered KinGAP within that year;
- The total number of children who have entered KinGAP since implementation;
- The total number of applications statewide, and number of KinGAP applications in each LDSS;
- The total number of KinGAP applications denied and accepted by an LDSS;
- The ages of children entering KinGAP;
- The number of fair hearings requested by KinGAP applicants and recipients, including the reasons for such hearing requests;
- The number of fair hearings held, the time frames within which decisions were rendered, and the number of fair hearings resolved in favor of the aggrieved party and the LDSS;
- Changes since implementation of KinGAP in the percentage of foster care children adopted, reunified, and released to other permanency outcomes;
- Changes since implementation of KinGAP in the percentage of children directly placed with relatives under Article 10 of the FCA; and
- Changes in the average length of stay in foster care.

This report is the fifth since the start of the KinGAP program in 2011. OCFS has seen a significant increase in the number of KinGAP applications and completed KinGAP arrangements in the past year, and expects this number to continue to rise in 2016, as social service districts and voluntary agencies become more familiar with the program and its benefits. OCFS has worked to assist districts and agencies with entering their KinGAP activity codes into the appropriate OCFS data systems to provide an accurate picture of the KinGAP work they have completed.

The remainder of this report will focus on the data collected as required by Chapter 58.

Summary of Data Reported by Districts


The data in this report are based on the data entered by social services districts in the OCFS system of record, the CONNECTIONS.

In 2015, 341 children entered the KinGAP program; 272 children in New York City and 69 from the rest of the state. Since the start of the KinGAP program in 2011, 1,063 children have achieved

permanency and have been discharged from foster care to a KinGAP arrangement (complete detail included on Table 1).

Based on the OCFS system of record, CONNECTIONS, between January 1, 2015, and December 31, 2015, a total of 421 KinGAP applications were received. Of those applications, 368 were received by New York City and 53 by counties in the Rest of State (ROS). In 2015, in addition to New York City, applications were received in 16 counties including Albany, Allegany, Broome, Cattaraugus, Chemung, Erie, Essex, Oneida, Onondaga, Orange, Rockland, Schenectady, Suffolk, Tompkins, Ulster, and Westchester. No KinGAP applications were denied. Statewide, 376 KinGAP applications were approved and 45 are pending (complete detail included on Table 2).

The KinGAP program continues serving children at a variety of ages, from less than two years old to older than 18 years of age at the time of their entry into KinGAP. Of the children who entered KinGAP in 2015, 15 children were between 0-2 years of age, 76 were ages 3-5, 86 between ages 6-9, 85 between ages 10-13, 29 between ages 14-18, 25 between ages 16-17 and 25 were age 18 and older. The majority of children entering the program were between 6-9 years of age, with ages 10-13 following next. The smallest numbers of children entering were in the 0-2 year age range (complete detail included on Table 3).



In 2015, OCFS received one fair hearing request on a KinGAP application payment issue. The payment issue was settled during the hearing. (Table 4).

Between 2011 and 2015, the percentage of all exits from relative foster care to KinGAP increased from 0.1 percent to 14.3 percent. In addition, the number of all permanent exits from all foster care settings since KinGAP implementation was 9,745 as compared to 12,581 during the baseline year of 2011. (Table 5, Part A and Part B).

Between 2011 and 2015, there has been a significant increase of 48.9 percent in the number of children placed directly (in the direct legal custody) with a relative or other suitable adult under Article 10¹ (non-LDSS Custody). This increase equates to 713 more children with direct relative placements in 2015 as compared to 2011. In New York City, the number of children directly placed with relatives decreased 45 percent, from 273 in 2011 to 149 in 2015. In ROS, the number of children directly placed with relatives increased 71 percent from 1,186 in 2011 to 2,023 in 2015.

Of the 1,459 children who were placed directly in the legal custody of relatives in 2011, 321 children moved to either relative foster care (99 children) or non-relative foster care (222 children) within 12 months of the direct relative placement. In comparison, of the 2,127 children who were placed directly with relatives in 2014, 356 children moved to either relative foster care (93 children) or non-relative foster care (263 children). In 2015, 2,172 children were placed directly with relatives. (Table 6).

The average length of stay for children exiting all foster care settings decreased 3.8 percent from 2011 from 30.7 months to 29.5 months in 2015. The average length of stay for children exiting foster care from approved relative homes increased 2.5 percent from 33.8 months in 2011 to 34.7 months in 2015 (Table 7, Parts A and B). Of the 279 children exiting care to KinGAP in 2015, the average length of stay was 41.3 months (Table 7, Part C). The decrease in length of stay for all children leaving care is a good sign, while the slight increase in average length of stay for children leaving relative homes highlights the need to continue to work with counties in 2016 to develop strategies to improve the number and timeliness of KinGAP exits specifically.

¹ Prior to November 7, 2011, there was one dispositional code (62) that was used for both relative and non-relative direct custodial placements; therefore, there was no way to separate out the relative from the non-relative data, though it is thought that most of these direct placements were with relatives. As of November 7, 2011, the use of dispositional code 62 was no longer allowed and districts were given two codes to separate out Article 10 direct custodial placements with relatives (88) and non-relatives (89).
