Dear Chief Executive Officer,

Thank you for submitting Herkimer County's Supervision and Treatment Services for Juveniles Program (STSJP) plan for Program Year (PY) 2023-2024. Your entire STSJP plan, including any amounts listed for PY 2023-2024 STSJP-RTA, has been **approved**.

The County is eligible to receive 62% State reimbursement for STSJP expenditures up to the capped STSJP allocation amount. Your municipality will continue to receive 49% State reimbursement for eligible detention services expenditures up to the capped allocation amount. If your municipality shifts a portion of its detention allocation into its STSJP plan, your municipality will receive 62% State reimbursement, up to the capped allocation, if such shifted funds are spent on STSJP eligible expenditures. A municipality may make a detention allocation shift at the time of the STSJP plan submission or up until June 30, 2024, unless otherwise approved by the Office of Children and Family Services.

If the County plans to shift its detention allocation for STSJP eligible expenses, please submit a request on official letterhead to Lynn Tubbs and email it to stsjp@ocfs.ny.gov outlining

1. the amount that will be shifted and
2. the type of programming or services the re-purposed detention funds will be used for under STSJP

Once the shift is approved, an amended STSJP plan will need to be submitted.

As a reminder, to access RTA reimbursement that a municipality may be eligible for, the expenditures must be specifically included in a locality's comprehensive RTA plan.

All STSJP claims, inclusive of STSJP-RTA, must be submitted electronically via the Juvenile Detention Automated System (JDAS) for the service period of October 1, 2023, to September 30, 2024. The following list illustrates the origin of intake by school district , associated zip code(s), and #: Herkimer: 13350-24, Central Valley Academy:- 13357,13407--14, Frankfort: 13340,13501--11, Little Falls: 13365--8, Middleville: 13416--4, Other: 13329,13439, 13502--16.</p> <p>There were also 14 YO's. One of which was originally charged as an AO but subsequently adjudicated as a YO and placed in OCFS custody pursuant to Penal Law Section 70.20 4a. Section B3 of this plan speaks in more detail about the local district and partnership response to the recent activity in Herkimer.</p> <p>Herkimer County PINS activity continues to follow last years trends. A total of 53 referrals were received by the diversion unit from the following sources: Parents (37), Schools (6), DSS (6), Police (3) and other (1). For purposes of comparison to the JD activity the school district referrals originated as follows: Central Valley Academy (18), Herkimer (17), Little Falls (7), Frankfort (2), Poland (2), and other (7). As indicated in previous plans, the majority of the youth behavior occurs along the "Valley Corridor" and follows the population density. Much of the activity occurs in the county seat (Herkimer) where services are more centralized and the county's stand alone public transportation system (Birnie Bus Co.) is readily accessible to families.</p> <p>Reviewing the placements for 2021-2022 it is evident that there have been, in the short run, some significant increases. In summary: OCFS Placements have increased from zero in 2021 to two in 2022.</p>

Foster Care admissions have escalated from 2021 (32) to 2022 (38). This is 19% increase from the prior year but as an overall 5 year trend it presents as a 32% decrease in placements.

JD Foster Care placements have increased sharply from 2021 (2) to 2022 (8). This very remarkable 300% increase is correlated with a 14% increase looking at the 5 years trend.

Post Dispositional PINS placements remained flat at zero continuing the prior years trend.

Other Child Welfare admissions remain at 30 for the second consecutive year and has trended downward by 30% as you look back five years.

There are many factors that contribute to the PINS/JD referrals and subsequent placements. It is noteworthy to discuss what we feel are the most influential. We review our at risk cases periodically with a team of individuals that have knowledge of each case. This usually includes caseworkers and their respective supervisors, Probation, any contractual staff or supervision that have been assigned, DSS Legal staff and any other relevant community partner that has an interest. There are recurring systemic themes that are identified, recorded, and brainstormed. The themes include but would not be limited to generational poverty, chronic neglect and abuse cases that evolve inevitably into PINS or JD matters, domestic violence, mental health of both the children and parents, and substance abuse. All of which I'm certain are common nationwide. Some of the more critical contributors and the numbers that they produce follow:

1. According to the most recent American Community Survey approximately 19.8% of Herkimer County children under the age of 18 live in poverty conditions. Further, roughly one third of the population in Herkimer County are receiving Medicaid or some type of public health coverage. Herkimer County has a strong economic development investment but the post-pandemic phenomenon of the availability of staff has hindered both the public and private sectors.
2. The Child Protective caseload is challenging but not only from a staffing standpoint. For 2021 and 2022 there were a total of 2138 SCR hotline calls. This resulted in the following actions: 144 petitions filed, 57 removals, 126 preventive referrals, 218 court ordered investigations, and affected a cumulative total of 2881 children.
3. Catholic Charities of Herkimer County is the only certified Domestic Violence service provider in Herkimer County. The incidents of family violence that were responded to in 2021 were 908 hotline calls and 255 victims served. In 2022 there were 1246 hotline calls and 408 victims served.
4. A few years ago Herkimer County closed it's childrens Mental Health clinic and left a large deficit in our ability to serve the <18 year old population. About four years ago a team of county employees lead by Public Health (including DSS, Youth Bureau, Mental Health) applied for a SAMHSA Expansion and Sustainability grant, were awarded the grant and set out to achieve the deliverables. One of the goals was to establish sustainable Mental Health clinics or expand existing clinics in an attempt to meet the needs of the children in Herkimer County. We have since been able to add or expand no less than 4 clinics throughout the county.

In 2020 the BAA admissions to detention represented 14% of overall admissions in NYS while BAA <18 population represented only 3% of general population. We plan to address this by increased engagement within the high need areas (Ilion, Herkimer). Also, by exploring Cultural Competency training that is offered by our partner, ICAN.

B. Local Collaboration

Please describe your municipality’s activities in developing this year’s STSJP plan in collaboration with local agencies responsible for probation, law enforcement, detention, diversion, social services, courts, service providers, schools, and youth development programs:

The STSJP plan is developed and written collaboratively by DSS, Probation, PINS, Youth Bureau, Integrated County Planning, and Integrated Community Alternatives Network (ICAN). These key stakeholders engage frequently with school officials, law enforcement, mental health representatives, and community service providers to identify barriers and review program design delivery. Monthly meetings with the Human Resource Planning Team, the Integrated County Planning leaders who have met consistently for over 25 years, are used to discuss and problem solve any service delivery barriers. As needs are identified, this group takes further action to improve programming.

A Youth Services Task Force convenes on a bi-monthly basis to ensure providers are kept informed of the many services available for youth in Herkimer County. This group is co-chaired by the DSS Director of Services and the Director of Employment and Training / One Stop Career Center, and the many members share freely all aspects of their programming with the group. Included in these meetings is an opportunity for members to discuss de-identified cases which they are finding difficult to serve; allowing for input from other providers which aids in problem solving from different points of view.

We are rebuilding the long-standing Youth Violence Prevention Committee, which focuses on relevant youth related topics involving youth of all ages. The membership includes representation from County Administration, school superintendents, local law enforcement, the district attorney’s office, DSS, Youth Bureau, Probation and Herkimer College. The Youth Violence Prevention Committee has served as the vehicle to deliver various messages to our partners as well as the public including presentation and analysis of movies such as Paper Tigers, it’s follow up Resilience, supporting Rachel’s Challenge, creation of our Suicide Prevention Coalition, exploring youth bullying through presentations by Jodee Blanco (author: "Please Stop

Laughing at Us..." and addressing social media challenges through a presentation by Thomas Kersting (Author: Disconnected: How to Reconnect our Digitally Distracted Kids").

A collaboration with Catholic Charities of Herkimer County has created a long-standing partnership which provide TREATY programming in our school districts. TREATY (Teaching Reconciliation in Education to Administrators, Teachers, and Youth) provides evidence-based programming on such topics as peer mediation, conflict resolution, and peer violence/ bullying prevention to students in grades 1 – 12.

The PINS Administrative Team meets regularly to brainstorm individual cases, identify trends, and determine trajectories through the JJ system. Input from members of the PINS Diversion Unit assist the Administrative Team in direct service issues and trends.

The STSJP program is presented to the Herkimer County Legislature Committee on Human Resources and the full legislature and has received unanimous support every year since its inception.

The goal of all Herkimer County youth services committees is to provide immediate intensive interventions to at-risk youth, while maintaining a safe community.

Herkimer County, in collaboration with ICAN, has developed a brief exit interview survey for all families upon discharge from the KHEID program. This survey asks youth and families questions about their experiences with the KHEID program, including its effectiveness in determining and working to achieve the family's definition of success, any barriers the family experienced with service delivery, gender responsiveness, or any concerns the family might have about structural, implicit, racial, gender, or ethnic biases. The results of these surveys are examined by the STSJP Development Committee as well as by ICAN and KHEID program coordinator for opportunities for improvement.

The KHEID program had made every effort to administer and collect the exit interview questionnaires that were planned for on the 2022-2023 plan that were to be utilized to gather information on program effectiveness, details surrounding the family's definition of success, barriers they might have experienced and concerns regarding biases that might have caused challenges that impacted their ability to reach their goals. During the first 8 months of the 2022-2023 EIDP plan there were 9 discharges from the program.

As a result of an uptick in youth involvement with local law enforcement officers, a Youth Behaviors Committee was formed. This committee is chaired by the Chief of Police for the Village of Herkimer, where a high number of delinquent incidents occur (zip code 13350). Members include the DSS Commissioner, DSS Director of Services, DSS Attorney, Probation Director, Probation Supervisor, Integrated County Planner, School Resource Officers, Herkimer High School Administration and Principal. Meetings have focused determining root causes of delinquency in the village. After a thorough review of records and data it was thought that uninvolved or absent parenting was a common theme in all cases. As schools report the same disruptive behaviors from the youth, with the same lack of response from parents, the focus turned to focus on strategies to improve responses and involvement from parents. As the ultimate responsibility for a child's destructive or delinquent behaviors falls to parents, the committee has approached the DA to discuss legal actions that can be taken when a parent refuses to cooperate with police regarding their child's behavior. These discussions are on-going.

The Kids Herkimer Early Intervention Program (KHEIDP) provides a comprehensive array of intensive community-based services to address the individual needs of Non-RTA and RTA youth involved in the juvenile justice (JJ) system. This program has demonstrated successful diversion of youth involved in the JJ system and has prevented out-of-home placements in previous years. KHEID works in collaboration with DSS and Probation to identify youth with the highest risk of further JJ involvement. Through multiple weekly contacts, assessments, and utilization of diverse individual and family supportive services, the program addresses youth and family needs, maintains safety within the community, promotes education attainment, and prevents further entry into the JJ system.

Service Provision for Individual Needs (SPIN) services are offered through the KHEIDP to youth who are engaging with KHEID program and whose needs exceed the scope of the KHEIDP.

The KHEID Program offered family-centered services with flexible and responsive service hours as needed to encourage and support active family engagement. The KHEID is gender responsive and offers strength-based support programs to offer respectful and impactful services to youth and families. The programs increase trust and engagement in services and lead to positive outcomes for youth and families.

3. Based on the program’s record of youth served, do you anticipate this program serving more or less than its projected capacity on 9/30/2023? Please explain:
 Yes, it is anticipated that the program will meet its projected capacity of 20 youth during the 2022-2023 plan year. Since 3/31/23, 4 additional youth have entered the program with a total of 16 youth being served since 10/1/23 and through the end of 5/31/23. The KHEID program would only need to receive an additional 4 referrals to the program in order to meet our capacity goal. This is believed to be a reasonable goal to reach by the end of the 2022-2023 plan year, that of 9/30/23.

5. How does the average length of service compare to what you would expect for that service type? For ATD/ATPDP and ATP service types, compare with the average length of stay for youth who were in detention and residential placements during the same time period.

The average length of stay for discharged youth in the EIDP during the 2022-2023 plan year is considerably higher than the average stay in detention or a residential facility for most youth. In order to have an average of 289 service days for 4 youth that had exited the program between 10/1/22-3/31/23, several or all of the youth would have had to been enrolled for a year or more. In fact, several of the youth that exited the program were stabilized but needed continued services from the EIDP to remain in the home setting for an extended duration.

An average of 289 EIDP service days is an increase as compared to the previous plan year. Having the youth enrolled in the KHEIDP for a lengthier period of time is viewed as an advantage as it takes some time to achieve the following: 1. assess youth and family needs and challenges, 2. establish a therapeutic rapport and deliver direct services, 3. link the youth and family to services as needed, 4. develop a clinically sound treatment plan and manage any adjustments necessary as time goes forward and 5. develop strong collaborative partnerships with all service providing stakeholders involved. This is how success is achieved in our experienced. Conversely, if a youth enters the KHEIDP and is presenting very unstable and risky behaviors that cause a barrier for these components to be established, the likelihood of that youth entering detention rises exponentially. We make every effort to expedite a swift and progressive timeline of events to help youth stay out of detention and residential care.

7. (a) What outcomes are on track to meet the goals set for PY 2022-2023?

(b) How will they be met?

It is assumed that the KHEIDP will have serviced 20 or more youth by the end of the plan year, 9/30/23. The following goals are on track to be met successfully based on the current tracking data compared to servicing 20 or more youth.

1. 90% of youth will have no PINS referrals during service engagement
2. 90% of youth will have no school suspensions during service engagement
3. 90% of youth will have their cases successfully adjusted/diverted during service engagement
4. 90% of youth will be able to identify at least once accessible, positive adult connection
5. 90% of youth will comply with program rules
6. 90% of youth will attend at least 90% of programming

The outcome percentages in the listed areas are projected to be met or exceeded given we meet our goal of servicing 20 or more youth by the end of the plan year. The STSJP KHEIDP plans on sustaining current success and meeting those benchmarks by continuing to provide quality coordination and individualized service provision to all youth enrolled in the program. All barriers to success are identified quickly and solutions are developed and employed swiftly as to avoid shortcomings in the areas listed above.

(b) Please describe any contributing barriers:

The following outcome goals/benchmarks are assumed to fall short of the 90% success rate identified for each category:

1. 90% of youth will have no truancies during service engagement-(currently we have 4 youth that have had truancy issues during enrollment. That being said, if we indeed sustain the current success and service 20 youth by the end of the plan year we will be achieving an 80% rate against truancies for enrolled youth.)
2. 90% of youth will have no arrests or probation intakes during service engagement-(currently we have 3 youth that had issued a charge or arrested during service engagement. If the program continues to sustain the current success and provide services for at least 20 youth by the end of the plan year we will achieve an 85% rate against arrests or new probation intakes in PY 2022/23.)
3. 90% of youth will be engaged in at least one positive community activity-(currently there have been 4 youth that presented persistent resistance to engaging in community-based activities, despite the efforts to coordinate such activities by the KHEIDP coordinator. If the KHEIDP sustains the current rate of success in this area we will have achieved an 80% success rate for youth engaging in positive community activities during PY 2022/23.)

It is inherent to the population the KHEIDP serves that resistance to change is unyielding to the interventions provided by the KHEIDP coordinator and those providers connected to planned and coordinated services. It is also inherent to rural areas that the availability of an effective service provider match becomes a barrier to connecting with disengaged youth that are resistant to the providers that are assigned to the client and family. With a larger provider pool, it would be more likely that we would be able to provide an intervention or personal connection that helps the youth and family make positive progress towards treatment goals. These are barriers at times to our success in the outcome goals/benchmark areas listed above that may not be achieved by the end of the PY 2022/23.

The Kids Herkimer EIDP will continue to search for creative interventions the KHEIDP coordinator can utilize to connect with, and make progress with, all youth that are enrolled in the program. The KHEIDP is also exploring the option of utilizing the Kids Herkimer Service Provision for Individual Needs (SPIN) services as needed to access a more diverse field of providers with the intention of reaching those youth that are presenting a greater challenge with service and program engagement. These services are available yet we have not appropriated the use of those services specific to overcoming engagement barriers and more clinically driven behavior modification challenges.
