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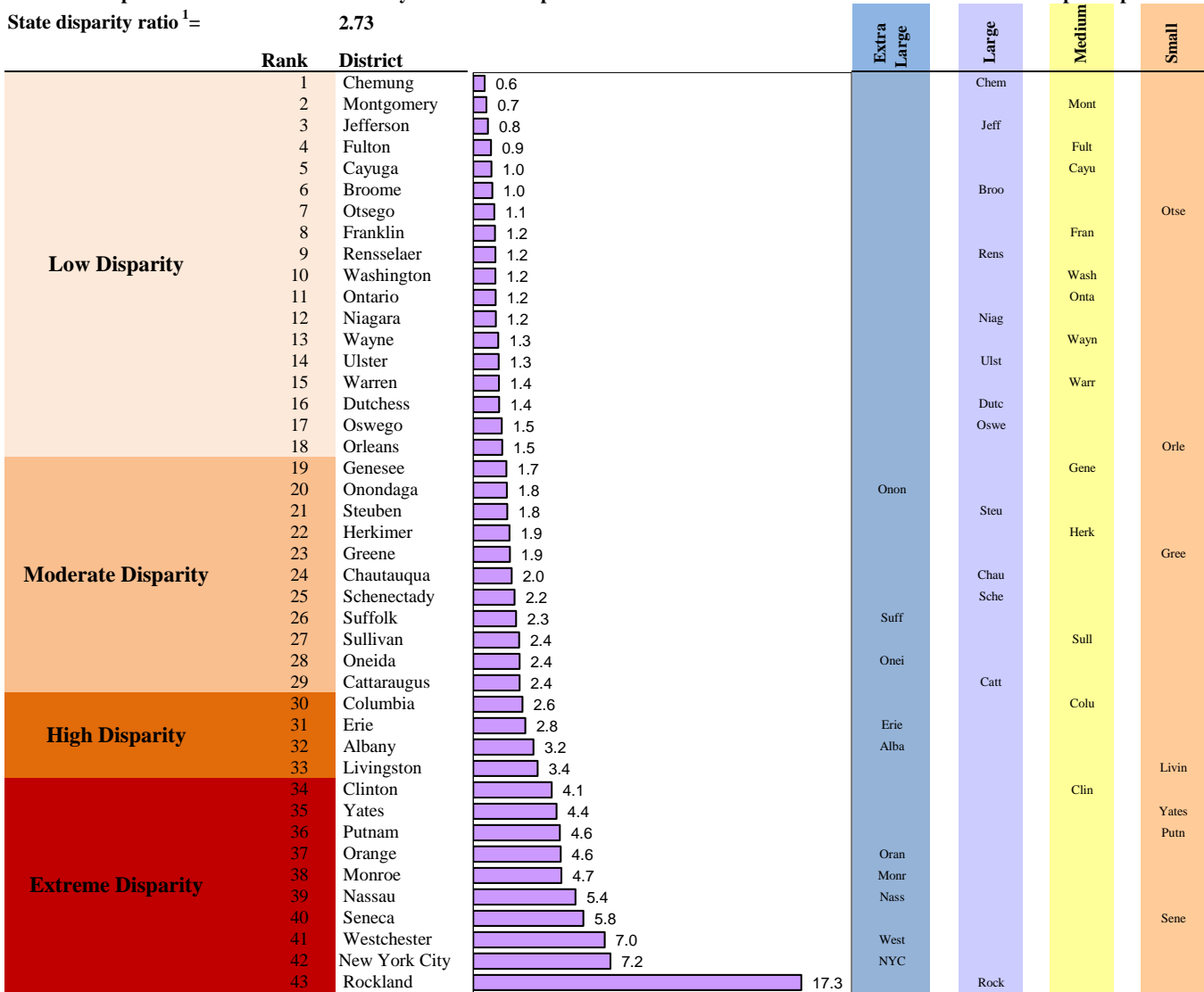

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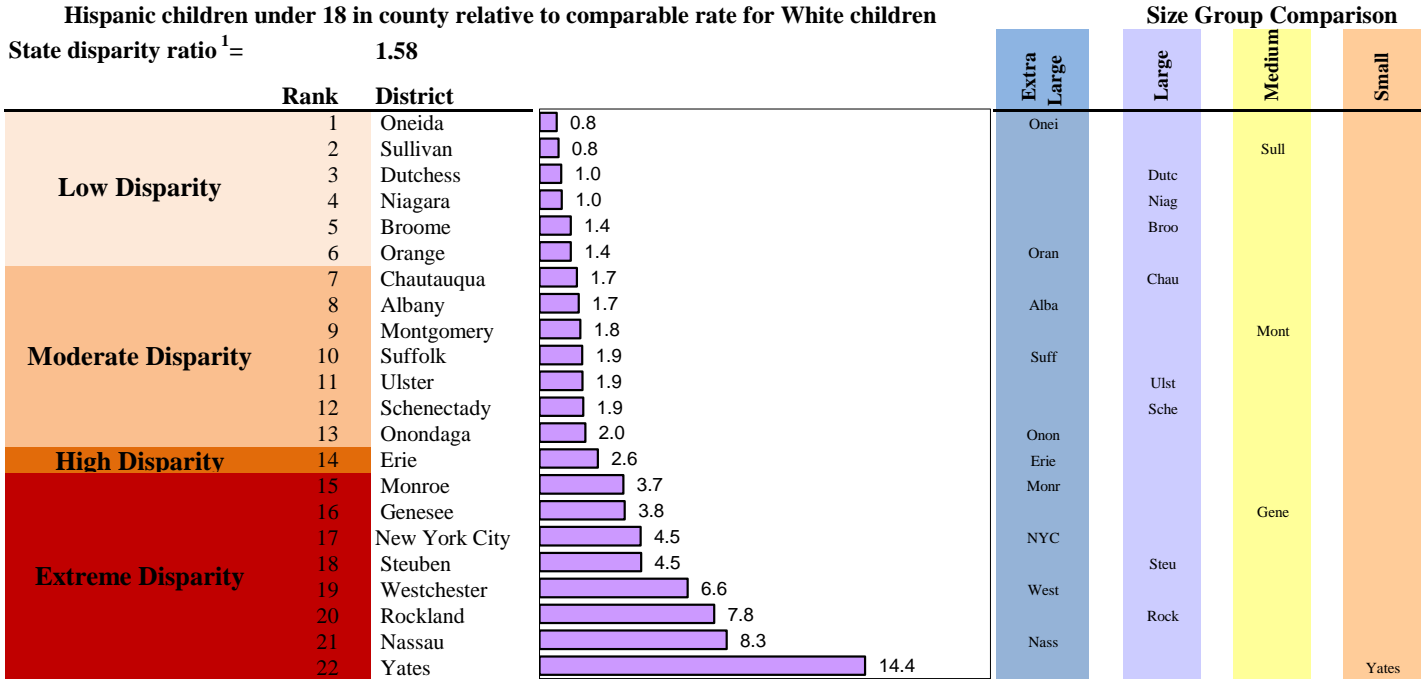

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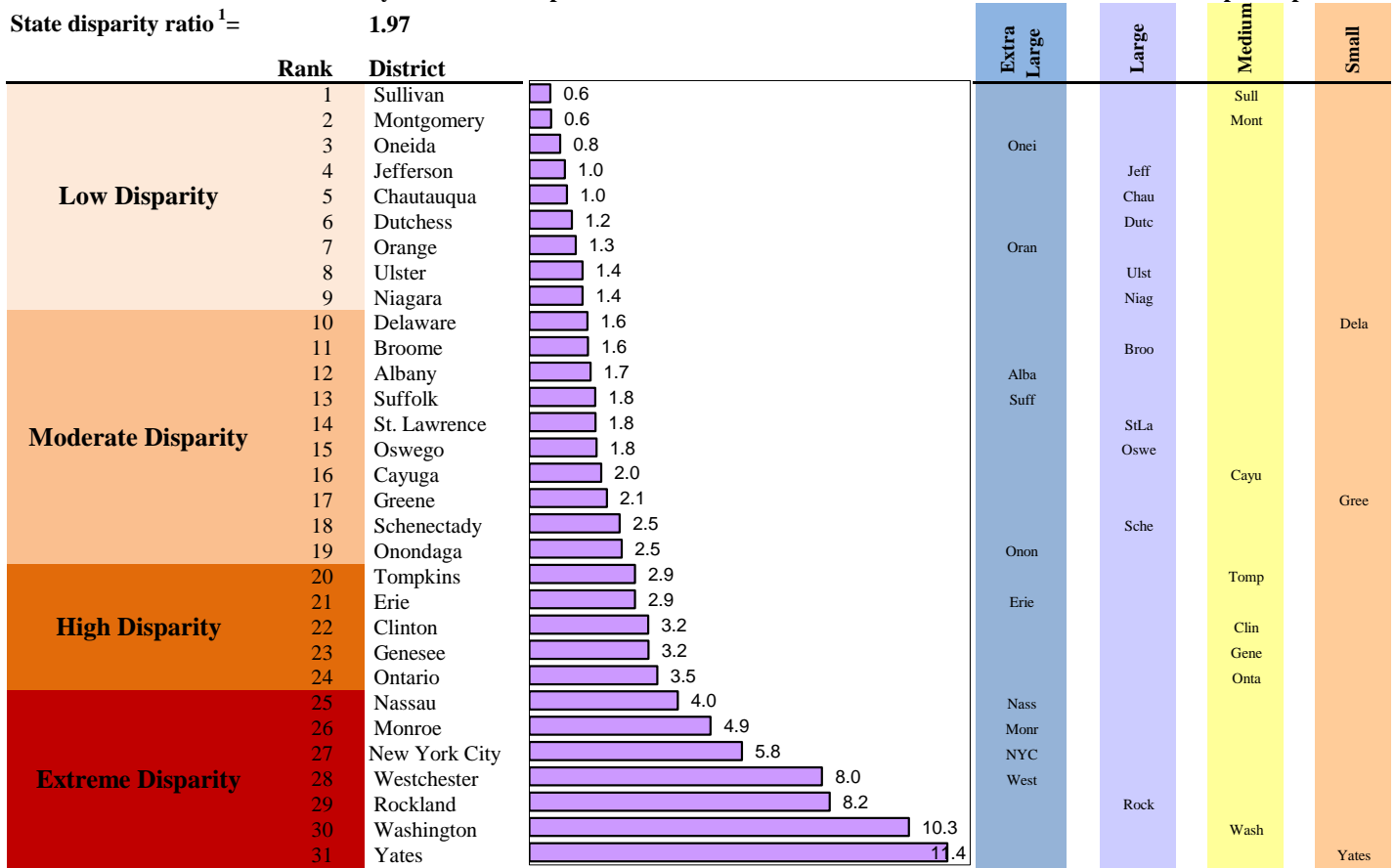
Hispanic Disparity Rate: Unique Children in Care CY 2022

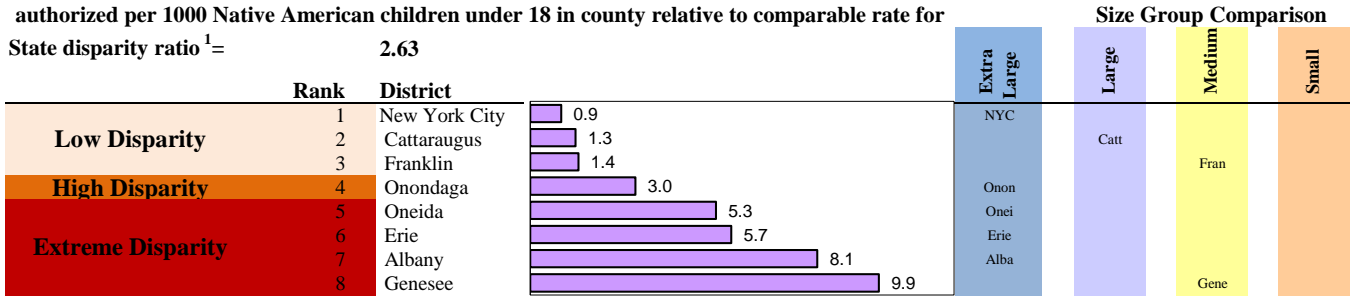
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Native American Disparity Rate: Unique Children with Preventive Services Authorized in CY 2022

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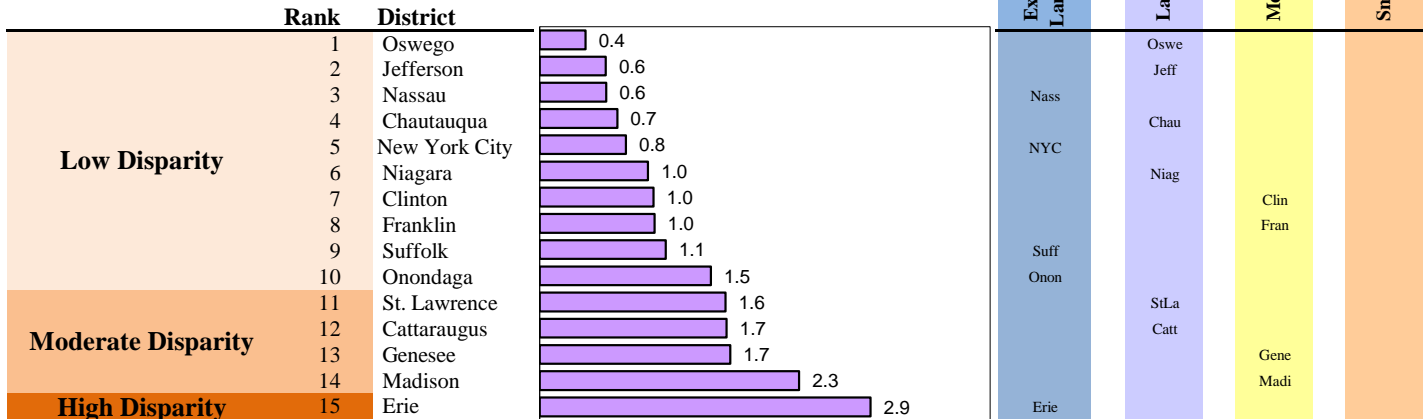
Native American Disparity Rate: Unique Children in CPS Reports CY 2022

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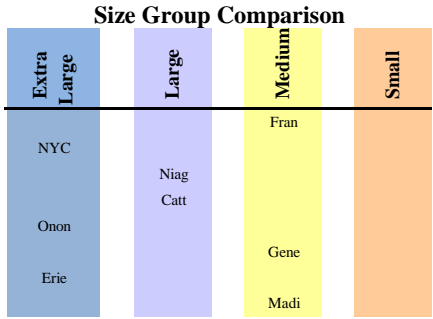

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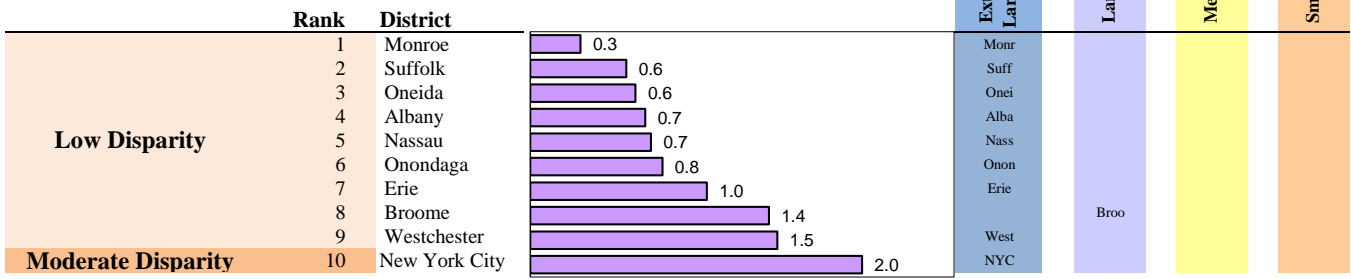

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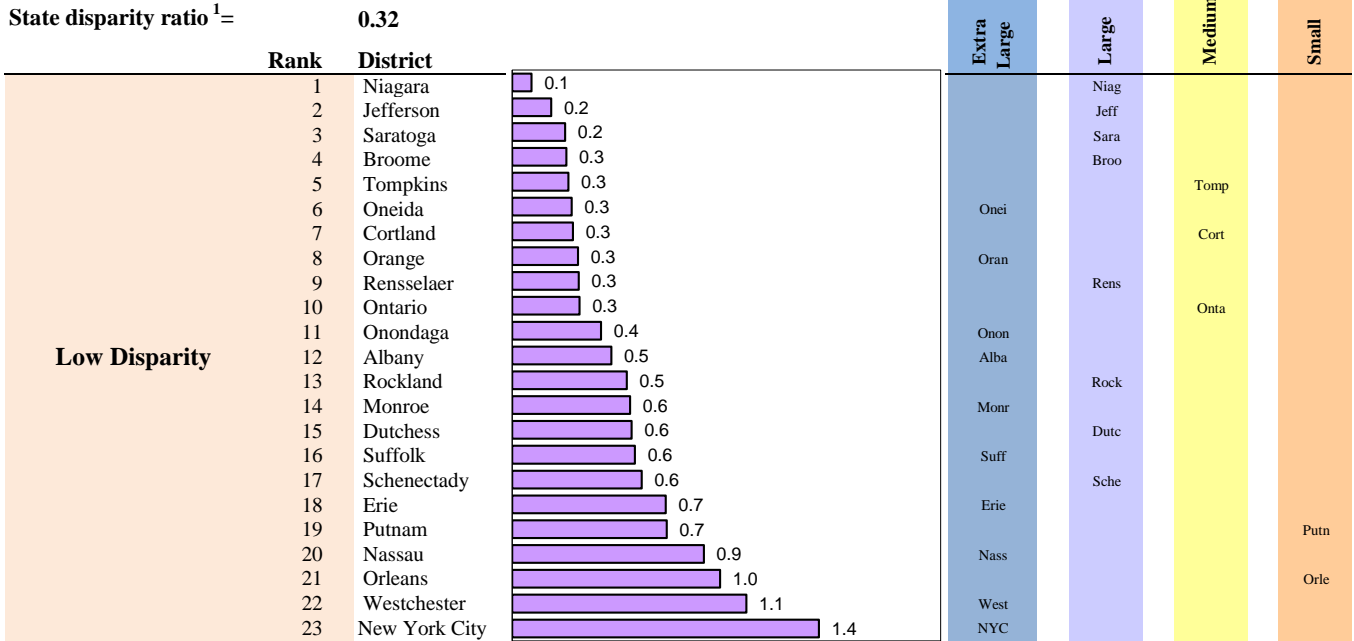
Asian/Pacific Islander Disparity Rate: Unique Children in CPS Reports CY 2022

Size Group Comparison



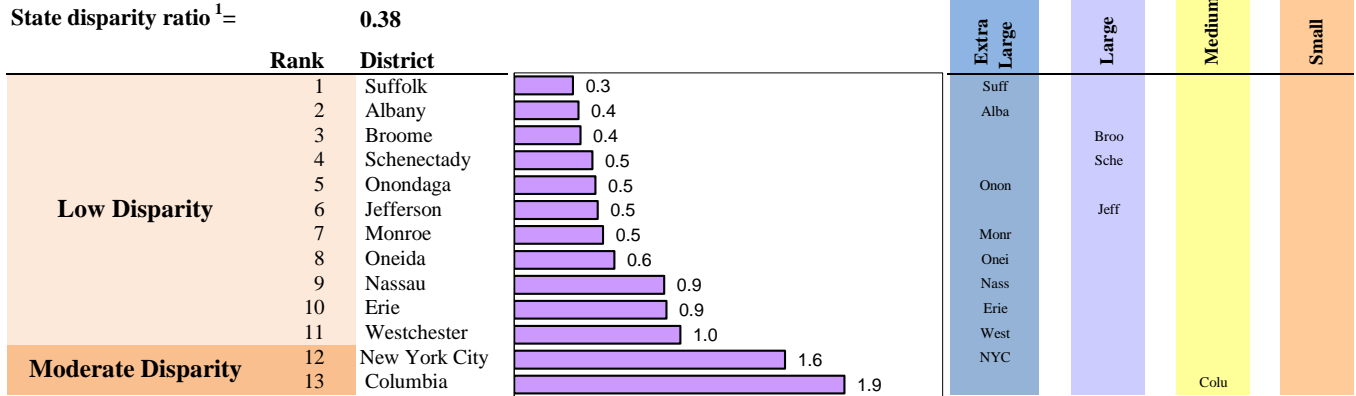
