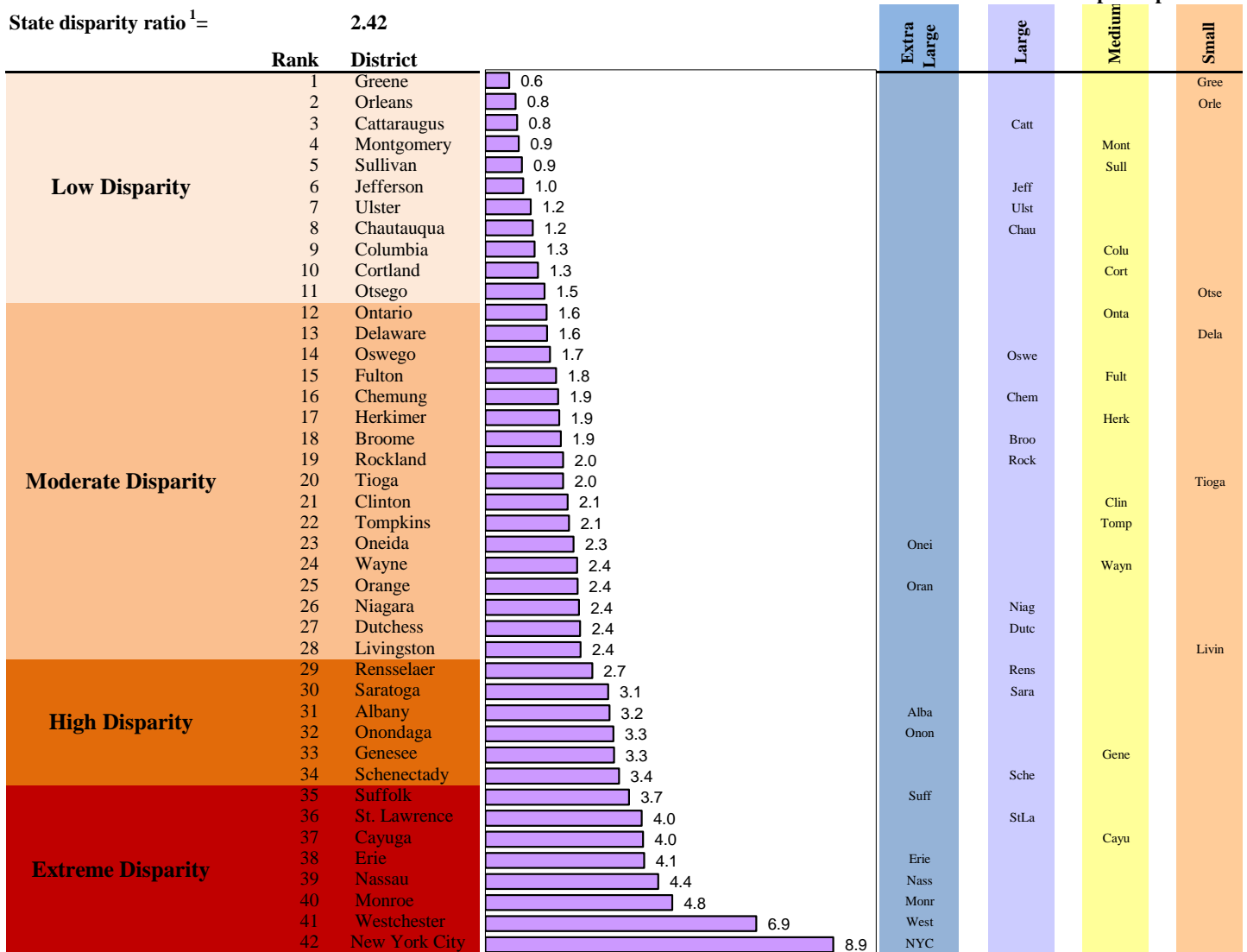

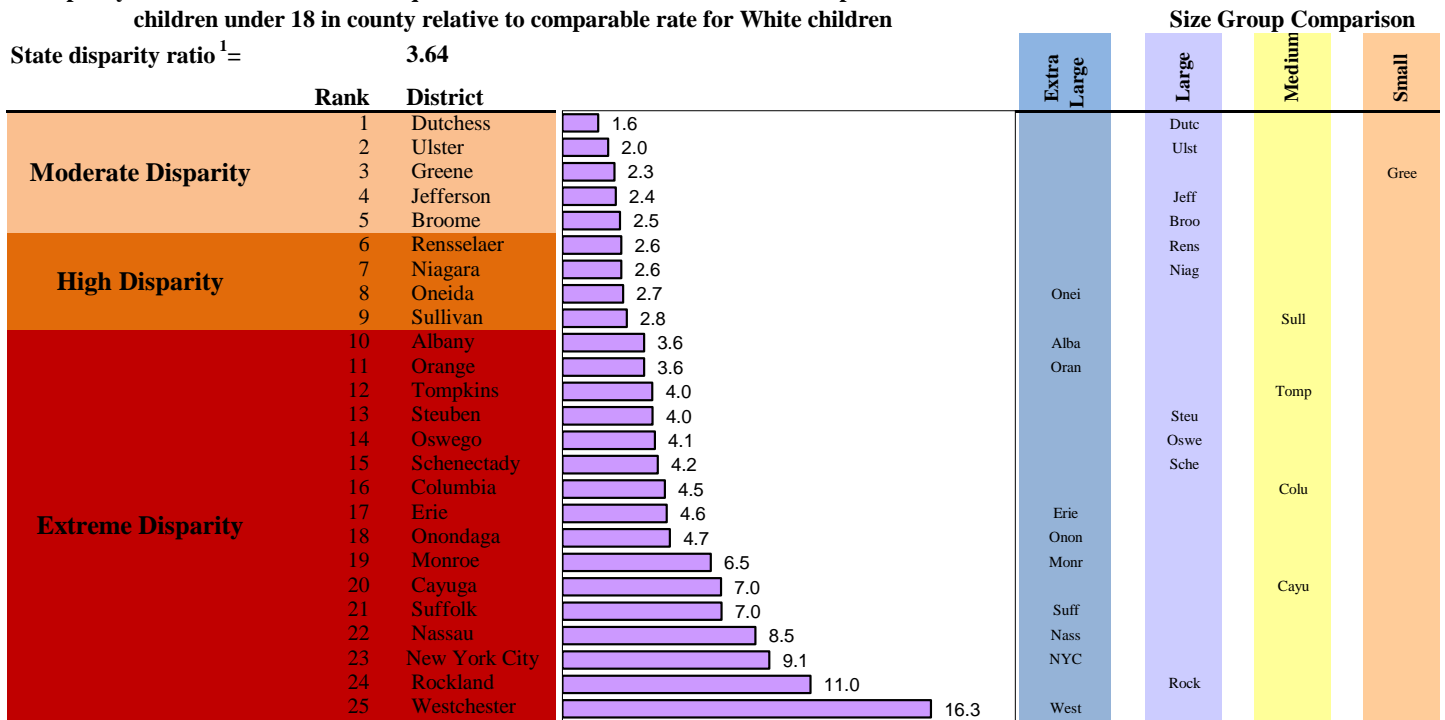

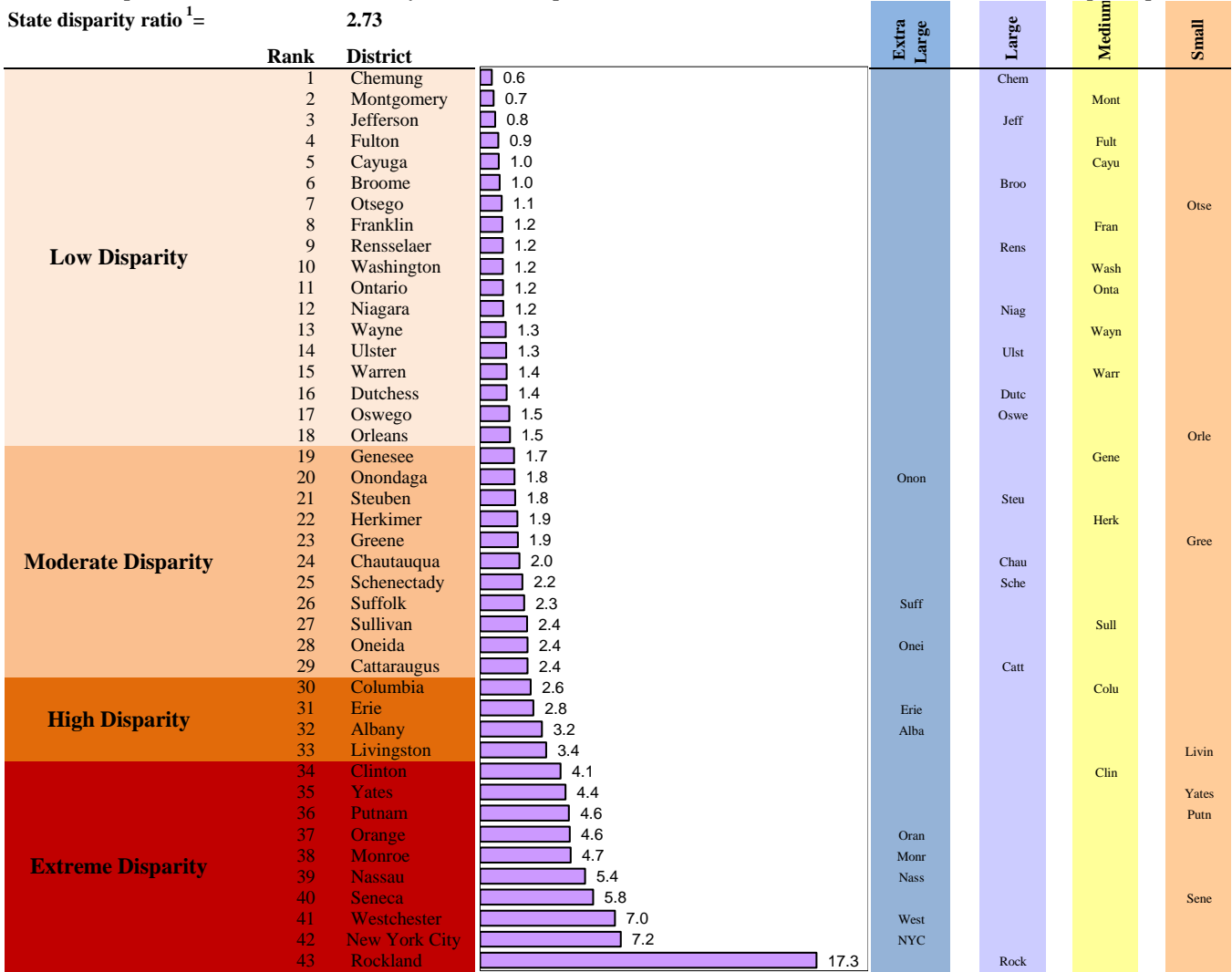

**Hispanic Disparity Rate: Unique Children Admitted in CY 2022**

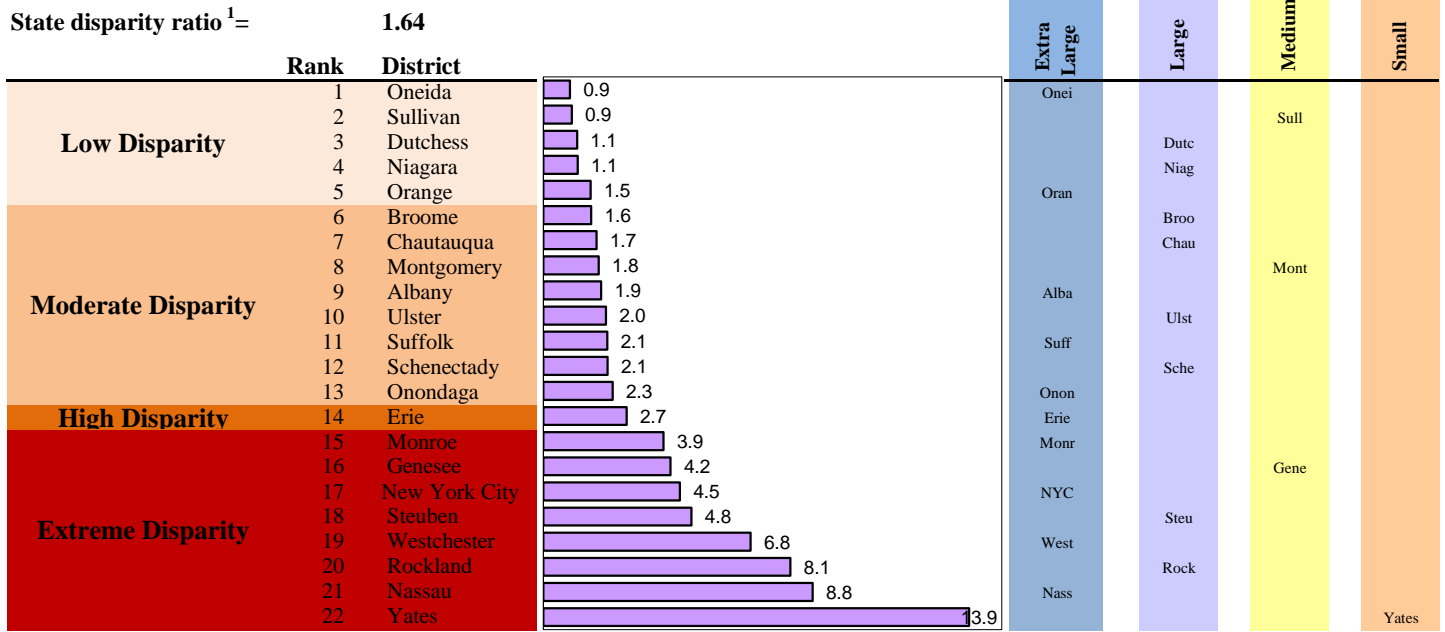

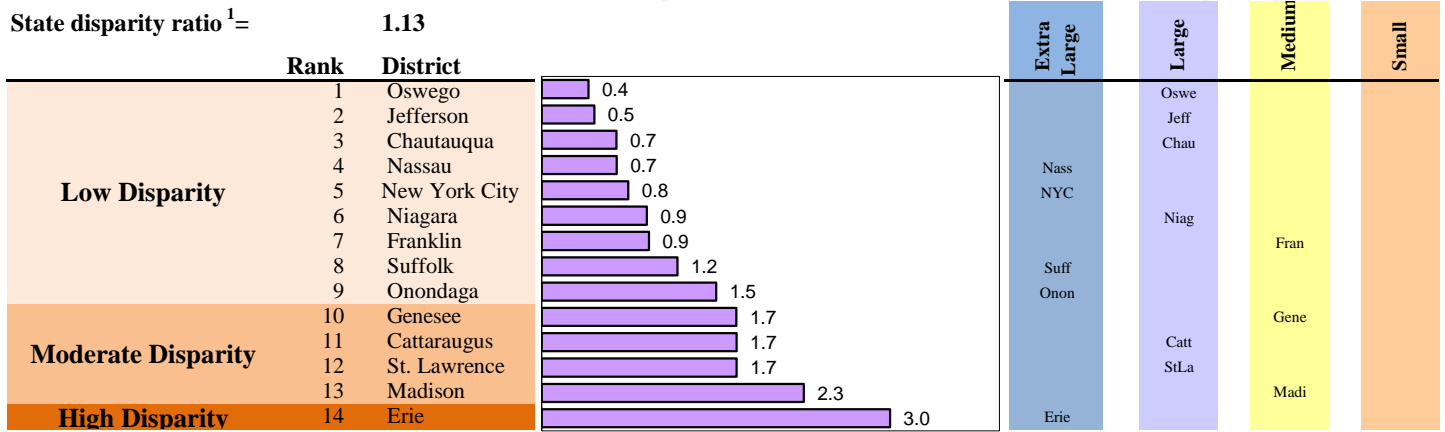

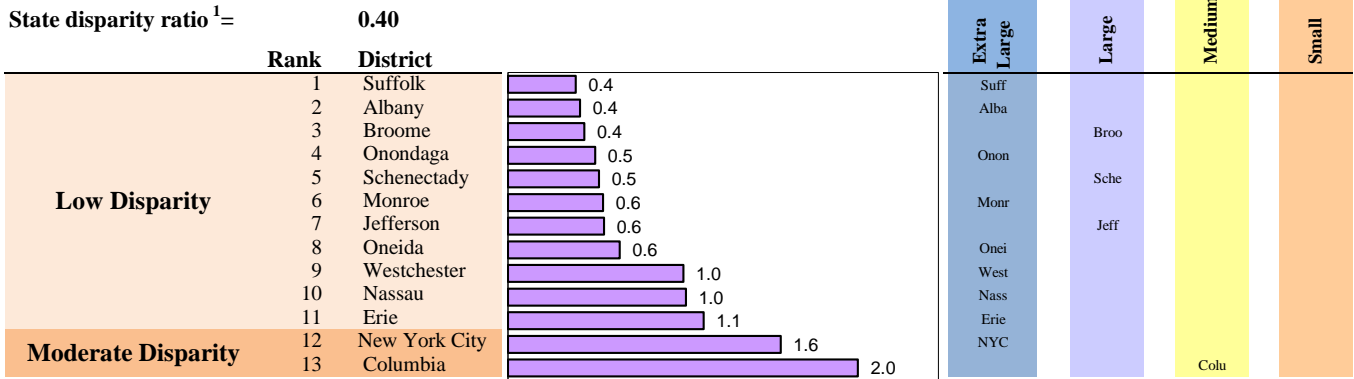

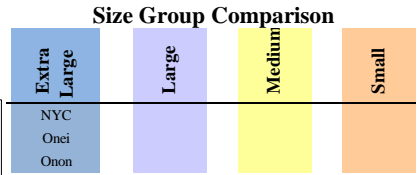
